

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CHAPTER - I

INTRODUCTION

The geographic location makes Odisha vulnerable to frequent cyclonic disturbances. The high wind, torrential rain and storm surge associated with the cyclone bring damage to the coastal settlements. Generally, the State is affected by the pre-monsoon (April, May & June up to onset of monsoon) and post-monsoon (October to December) cyclonic events.

During the last decade, the State faced either cyclone or other disasters like flood, tornado or drought every year.

Cyclone Occurrences in the recent past

The cyclone which had severe impacts on Odisha coast in the recent past is given below:



CHAPTER - II

TRACKING OF CYCLONE "DANA"

On 20.10.2024, India Meteorological Department (IMD) issued a bulletin sayingthat a cyclonic circulation laid over North Andaman Sea in the early morning (0530 hours IST) and persisted over the same region in the forenoon (0830 hrs IST) of 20th October 2024. Under its influence, a Low-Pressure Area was very likely to form over the East central Bay of Bengal and adjoining north Andaman Sea during next 24 hours.

It was very likely to move west-north-westwards and intensify into a depression by 22nd October morning and into a cyclonic storm by 23rd October, 2024 over East-Central Bay of Bengal. Thereafter, it was very likely to move north-westwards and reach northwest Bay of Bengal off Odisha-West Bengal coasts by 24th October morning.


On 21.10.2024, IMD reported thata low-pressure areaformed over the East central Bay of Bengal and adjoining north Andaman Seain the early morning (0530 hours IST) of 21st October 2024 under the influence of the cyclonic circulation. It would very likely to move west-north-westwards and intensify into a depression by 22nd October morning and into a cyclonic storm by 23rd October, 2024 over east central Bay of Bengal. Thereafter, it wouldvery likely to move north-westwards and reach northwest Bay of Bengal off Odisha-West Bengal coasts by 24th October morning.

Soon after receiving the meteorological warningabout formation of low-pressure area over the East central Bay of Bengal and possible formation of cyclonic storm that could hit Odisha, the State Government started closely monitoring the situation. A high-levelreview meeting was conducted under the chairmanship of Hon'ble Chief Minister on 21.10.2024 with allconcernedSecretaries/Collectors and necessary directions were passed to chalk out the preparatory measures.

Based on the forecast issued by IMD and other international Agencies like Regional Integrated Mult hazard Early Warning Systems (RIMES), Joint Typhoon Warning Center (JTWC), the tracking of the system was thoroughly done by the Experts of Odisha State Disaster Management Authority (OSDMA) in GIS platform regarding possibility of its likely impact on Odisha.

On 22.10.2024, IMD reported that the well-marked low pressure area formed over East central Bay of Bengal moved west- north-westwards, concentrated into a depression and lay centred at 0530 hrs IST of 22nd October, over the same region near latitude 15.4° N and longitude 91.2°E, about 730 km southeast of Paradip (42976, Odisha), 770 km south-southeast of Sagar Island (42903, West Bengal) and 740 km south-southeast of Khepupara (41984, Bangladesh).


It would very likely to move west-north-westwards and intensify into a cyclonic storm by 23rd October, 2024 over east central Bay of Bengal. Thereafter, continuing to move north-westwards, it would very likely to intensify into a severe cyclonic storm over northwest Bay of Bengal by 0000 UTC of 24th and cross north Odisha and West Bengal coasts between Puri and Sagar Island during 1800 UTC of 24th and 0000 UTC OF 25th October, 2024 as a severe Cyclonic Storm with a wind speed of 100-110 kmph gusting 120 kmph.



TRACK OF THE CYCLONE ON 22.10.2024

As per IMD's bulletin on 23.10.2024, the cyclonic storm "DANA" over Eastcentral Bay of Bengal moved northwestwards with a speed of 15 kmph during past 6 hours and lay centred at 0830 hrs IST of 23rd October, over the same region near latitude 16.5°N and longitude 89.6°E, about 520 km southeast of Paradip (Odisha), 600 km south-southeast of Sagar Island (West Bengal) and 610 km south of Khepupara (Bangladesh). It is very likely to move northwestwards and intensify into a severe cyclonic storm over northwest Bay of Bengal by early morning of 24th and cross north Odisha and West Bengal coasts between Puri and Sagar Island close to Bhitarkanika and Dhamara (Odisha) during night of 24th to morning of 25th October, 2024 as a severe Cyclonic Storm with a wind speed of 100-110 kmph gusting 120 kmph.

On 24.10.2024, IMD in its evening bulletin reported that the severe cyclonic storm "DANA" (pronounced as Dana) over northwest Bay of Bengal moved north-north-westwards with a speed of 15 kmph during past 6 hours and lay centred at 2030 hrs IST of 24th October, over the same region, near latitude 20.1° N and longitude 87.3°E, about 70 km east-southeast of Paradip (Odisha), 90 km south-southeast of Dhamara (Odisha) and 190 km south-southwest of Sagar Island (West Bengal). It would very likely to move north-north-westwards and cross north Odisha and West Bengal coasts between Puri and Sagar Island close to Bhitarkanika and Dhamara (Odisha) during mid-night of 24th to morning of 25th October, 2024 as a severe Cyclonic Storm with a wind speed of 100-110 kmph gusting 120 kmph.



TRACK OF THE CYCLONE ON 24.10.2024

The system was under continuous surveillance of the Doppler Weather Radar at Paradip and Gopalpur.


OCCURRENCE & INTENSITY

The Cyclone "DANA" (pronounced as Dana) crossed north Odisha coast close to Habalikhati Nature Camp (Bhitarkanika) and Dhamaraduring 0130 hrs IST to 0330 hrs IST of 25 th Octoberwith a wind speed of 100-110kmph gusting to 120 kmph and lay centred at 0230 hrs IST of 25 th October, over Odisha coast, near latitude 20.7° N and longitude 87.0 °E, about 60 km northeast of Paradip (Odisha), 20 southeast of Dhamara (Odisha) and 150 km southwest of Sagar Island (West Bengal).

It lay centred at 0330 hrs IST of 25th October over north coastal Odisha near latitude 20.85° Nand longitude 86.9°E, about 10 km north of Dhamara and 20 km north-northwest of Habalikhati NatureCamp (Bhitarkanika).Later, it moved nearly west-north-westwards across north Odisha and weakened gradually into acyclonic storm by forenoon of 25th October.



The Doppler image at Paradeep that showed the storm before crossing the Odisha coast on 24.10.2024 can be seen below.



Rainfall Status:

The average rainfall of the state from 25th October to 26th October 2024 (cumulative) was 37.3 mm as against the normal average rainfall of 7.4 mm for two days in that month.

Bhadrak had recorded average rainfall of 239.6 mm. Three districts namely Kendrapada, Balasore and Jajpur had recorded average rainfall more than 100 mm during the above two days due to the impact of the cyclone. Besides, 6 districts had recorded average rainfall more than 50 mm.

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


RAINFALL REPORTS OF DIFFERENT BLOCKS FROM 25TH OCTOBER TO 26THOCTOBER, 2024.

3 Blocks recorded rainfall more than 300 mm in the above 2 days. Similarly, 11 Blocks recorded rainfall more than 200 mm and 30 Blocks have recorded rainfall from 100 mm to 200 mm from 25th to 26th October 2024. CHAPTER - IV

PREPAREDNESS

Keeping in view the possible situation, the Office of Special Relief Commissioner started massive preparedness to combat the crisis. Instructions were issued to the concerned District Collectors of the vulnerable districts and the Departments to ensure necessary preparatory measures to encounter the situation. Accordingly, the Collectors of all the 14 probable affected districts such as Balasore, Bhadrak, Kendrapara Jagatsinghpur, Mayurbhanj, Jajpur, Cuttack (in red zone) and Puri, Angul, Nayagarh, Khordha, Keonjhar, Dhenkanal and Ganjam (in orange zone) convened the meeting of their respective District Disaster Management Authorities (DDMAs) and remained in full preparedness to effectively deal with the situation. The District Emergency Operation Centres including the State Emergency Centre were activated to operate round the clock. Hon'ble Chief Minister, Odisha and Hon'ble Minister, Revenue & DM visited the State Emergency Operation Centre located in the office of Special Relief Commissioner and reviewed the pre-cyclone preparedness activities. He categorically stressed open to adhere to the principle of "Zero Casualty in management of the disaster". The Control Rooms at Blocks, Sub- divisions and Tahasils were also activated. The fishermen on sea were asked to immediately return to the shore.

Shelter Buildings

- 842 Multipurpose cyclone shelters/Multipurpose flood shelters ready to
 accommodate the evacuated people. Besides, 5402 temporary shelter buildings
 have been identified by the district administration and ready for accommodation.
 About 10.60 Lakh people from 3026 low lying vulnerable villages were evacuated
 in the above 14 districts by evening. Necessary arrangements were made for
 provision of food, drinking water, lighting, sanitation and health facility along with
 baby food in such shelters.
- In addition, Lady Constables/ Home-guards/ ASHA/ AWC workers were deployed in the shelters by Collectors.

Precautionary Measures taken to combat the situation

- Engineering Departments made necessary advance arrangements for clearance of road traffic after the cyclone. At least 3/4 Earthmovers/Excavators along with Tractors shall be kept in readiness to assist the work.
- All fishing boats numbering 19362 plying Odisha coast were safely berthed in their respective FLCs/ FH.
- Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India was requested to provide one Helicopter to be used for relief and rescue operations.
- Schools, Colleges, Universities as well as Anganwadi Centres in the 14 districts under warning remained closed from 23rd to 25th October.
- Leave of Government officers was cancelled from 23rd to 25th October.
- All the three port authorities Gopalpur, Paradip and Dhamara were instructed to hoist signal DC-I.
- Overhead water tanks kept filled in private and public buildings.
- Instruction was given to remove hoardings in coastal districts.
- Safety of Habishyalis and other Tourists in Puri were ensured by the district administration.
- Anti snake venoms and adequate number of technical personnel kept readily available at PHC level.
- All the Telecom Service Providers were requested for uninterrupted service through Telecom Towers with Genset, fuel backup. "Cell on Wheels" (CoWs) were arranged by the TSPs if required.
- Diesel, Kerosene, Petrol, LPG already available with the stockists.
- Sufficient polythene sheets made available with the district administration to be used as temporary shelter materials. Besides, 2500 MT polythene sheets are also available with the SRC as buffer stock.
- Hoarding of Essential Commodities and inflation of rates thereof was strictly dealt with by the Collector and FS & CW officials. Simultaneously, awareness drives to prevent panic buyingby Consumers.
- 739 gangs made available with the DISCOMS for power restoration.

Response Forces

- ODRAF and NDRF teams were stationed/ deployed at strategic locations to carry out search & rescue operations.
- 51 ODRAF Teams, 178 fire service teams and 20 NDRF teams were deployed.
- Additional 40 Fire services teams were kept ready for deployment.
- Additional 5 NDRF teams were airlifted from Bhatinda and kept ready for deployment as per requirement.
- Animal Rescue was also taken up along with Human Rescue work by all rescue teams.

Review & Monitoring:

Review Meetings by Hon'ble Chief Minister

Hon'ble Chief Minister in the presence of Hon'ble Minister, Revenue & DM took a
meeting on 21.10.2024, 23.10.204, 24.10.2024. 25.10.2024, 26.10.2024 &
27.10.2024 with the concerned Collectors, Secretaries of the concerned
Departments, DG Police, DG (Fire Services), ADG Law & Order and gave
necessary instructions as follows-

- Loss of crops will be estimated by Dept. of Agriculture.
- Preparation of Contingency Plan for Rabi crops by Dept. of Agriculture.
- To avoid any rumour/misinformation among public, SRC office has to brief media. In addition, SRC, OSDMA, I&PR, R&DM, A&FE and Home department should update authentic posts in their social media handle.
- Energy Dept. to ensure timely restoration of power supply.
- People of low lying and Kutcha houses are to be shifted to shelter, to avoid casualty due to wall collapse and any other eventualities.
- Telecom companies to be informed for emergency arrangement and Intra Circle Roaming.
- Diesel, kerosene, petrol, LPG should be sufficiently procured by Stockist.
- Sufficient fodders to be made available for animals.
- Railway dept. to be informed to keep the track intact.
- Schools to remain closed and identified for temporary cyclone shelters.
- ULBs should be asked to take out the billboards/sign board.

- sufficient fodder has also been arranged for them.
- All the teams are fully geared up to facilitate movement, restore power supply and safe drinking water after the cyclone.
- The district Collectors of Keonjhar, Dhenkanal and Angul districts have also been asked to remain alert as there is a possibility of a curve in the course of the cyclone.
- The Government is keeping a close watch on the situation. The ministers are visiting the blocks and panchayats in the respective districts to monitor the preparations.
- Senior officers are also in charge of the preparation of arrangements in the district.

25.10.2024

- Achieved our 'Zero Casualty' target as per the data available. Achieved full success in dealing with the cyclone.
- District collectors have been directed to assess the post-cyclone damage.
- The places where the road has been blocked by falling trees, should be cleared.
- Electricity connections should be restored in places where power supply has been disrupted.
- Train services have also started. Train will run from Bhubaneswar and Puri on time.
- Flight operations have also returned to normalcy. The first flight started at Bhubaneswar airport at 9 AM today.
- More than 1,600 of the pregnant women among others who were shifted to various health centres and maternity homes in the affected areas gave birth to

newborns safely. It is a matter of happiness for us that both the mother and the children are completely healthy.

• The impact of Cyclone 'DANA' has reduced. People have started returning to their homes from shelter homes, but extreme cautious should be maintained and people should be allowed to stay at Shelters till their houses become habitable.

26.10.2024 (Morning)

- The restoration of power supply in Puri, Khordha,
 Jagatsinghpur, Cuttack has been ensured to 100%.
 However, Balasore, Bhadrak, Jajpur, Kendrapara,
 Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj to be ensured 100% power
 supply restoration by this evening.
- The DC-cum-Additional Chief Secretary, Water Resources department to closely monitor the flood like situation in Budhabalanga river due to heavy rainfall in upper catchments.
- The low-lying areas and vulnerable locations to be closely monitored and the people may be shifted to safer places to avoid any untoward situation.
 Budhabalanga river is flowing at Gobindpur gauge station with water level 7.80 meter against danger level of 8.13 which should be closely monitored.
- The Principal Secretary, RD informed that out of 71 blocked roads 68 roads have been cleared. It is directed that the remaining roads to be cleared by today.
- There are certain roads, drinking water supply systems and power supply have been affected in the ULBs of Balasore, Bhadrak and Kendrapara. These are to be restored immediately.
- The renovation of multipurpose cyclone shelters and flood shelters to be taken up. The additional shelters

- shall also be constructed. The PR & DW department will make an assessment of the requirement of such shelters.
- All the damaged kutcha houses should be enumerated and detailed report shall be prepared by the PR & DW Department for construction of new pucca houses.
- The I &PR Department shall make documentation of rescue, relief and other such successful works done for effective management.
- Village level response committee will be constituted in each village.
- The FE & CC Department to take necessary steps for mangrove plantation.
- District collectors of Balasore, Bhadrak, Mayurbhanj have also been asked to remain alert for probable flood like situation.

26.10.2024 (Evening)

- Kendrapara, Bhadrak and Balasore districts were affected by cyclone 'Dana'. In these districts, wind fallen trees have disrupted power supply & road traffic. That should be restored by tonight.
- All road blockages have been cleared in Balasore by this evening. Power supply to nearby 81 percent consumers has been restored. The remaining restoration work is on progress.
- Due to the rains in Similipal, the water level of Budhabalang River in Balasore district is increasing.
 But since the rain is on decline, the water level may recede. As many as 20 villages in 6 GPs in Balasore district have been affected by the floods.
- The administration has so far shifted 2,500 people from Remuna block and 8,000 from Balasore Sadar

block to safe shelters. R. Budhabalanga is expected to flow above the danger level and as such the district Administration, ODRAF and Fire Services are on full alert. All concerned to remain fully alert to meet any eventuality.

- Electricity and communication have been restored in Mayurbhanj.
- Power Restoration is getting hindered in Bhadrak due to water logging. As of now, nearby 77 percent restoration is over. Approximately, 70 thousand consumers are still in darkness. More teams have been deployed in action and the situation will be normal soon.
- Regarding Kendrapara, Hon'ble Chief Minister stated that, situation is mostly normal in the district. As of now, power has been restored to nearby 95 percent consumers. Work is going on war footing to restore power to the rest 15 thousand consumers who are still in darkness.
- As observed from IMD report, Cyclone 'DANA' has
 dissipated but flood situation has arisen due to heavy
 rainfall. The Budhabalanga is little above the warning
 level which threatens flooding of low-lying areas of
 Balasore, Bhadrak. This should be closely watched
 and necessary measures should be taken.
- 21 boats of ODRAF will be deployed for Search & Rescue operation immediately.
 - 12 boats will be deployed at Balasore and 9 boats will be deployed at Mayurbhanj.
- Additional 2 ODRAF teams will be deployed at Balasore and 2 ODRAF teams will be deployed at

Mayurbhanj.

- Boats will be deployed in Mayurbhanj & Balasore districts.
- Steps will be taken for construction of Pucca houses.
- Underground cabling for power supply will be done as a long term solution.
- Mangrove plantation will be revived.
- Temporary breaches across the roads for discharge of water from inundated area have been made which may lead to increase in the road damage. This should be prepared on priority as soon as the water recedes.
- 8 lakh 9 thousand 513 people were brought to the cyclone shelters. People have returned to their homes after the situation returned to normal. At present, only 1,10,470 people are in shelters. They should be properly looked after.
- Crops on about 2 lakh hectares of land have been damaged. Once the water is released, it should be properly assessed and immediate relief should be provided to the farmers.

Aerial Survey by Hon'ble Chief Minister:

Hon'ble Chief Minister made an aerial survey of the affected areas on 27.10.2024
 a on 28.10.2024 and took a review meeting with the Hon'ble Minister, Revenue & DM, Secretaries of concerned departments and Senior Officers of the State Govt. about the damages and relief measures.

Clearance of Rural Roads:

All the roads blocked due to falling of trees and debris in Balasore, Bhadrak, Kendrapada, Jagatsinghpur, Dhenkanal, Jajpur, Mayurbhanj, Keonjhar, Khordha and Puri werecleared within 48 hours with the help of NDRF, ODRAF, Fire Service and OFDC personnel.

Restoration of Power:

22,84,264 consumers were affected in Balasore, Bhadrak, Cuttack, Jagatsinghpur, Jajapur, Kendrapara, Khordha, Keonjhar, Mayurbhanj and Puri. 98 % power was restored in 4 days.

CHAPTER – VI IMPACT & DAMAGES

The damages caused by cyclone 'DANA' were mainly due to gusting action of wind and heavy rainfall. As per report received from Collectors, 41.23 lakh people in 11942 villages of 153 Blocks in 14 Districts have been affected. 3,62,935.37 hectares of agriculture/ horticulture crop land have been damaged. The handicraft artisans have lost their raw materials. Livestock and poultry farmers have also sustained loss. Besides, substantial damage has been caused to public properties.

House Damage

17 kutcha houses have been fully damaged, 82 pucca/ kutcha houses have been severely damaged due to the cyclone. Besides, 164 pucca houses and 14,458 kutcha houses have been damaged partially. Similarly, 1290 huts and 6209 cowsheds attached to houses have been damaged. The district-wise details are given under **Appendix-VII**.

Crop Damage

Total 1,78,136.53 hectare of crop area affected, out of that 87,855.47 hectare of crop area sustained crop-loss to the extent of 33% and above due to cyclone associated with heavy rain. The details are given under **Appendix-IV**.

Loss of Livestock

77 livestock and 4220 poultry birds were lost due to cyclone & heavy rain. The district-wise figures of affected livestock are given in following table.

CHAPTER - IX

CONCLUSION

The State took advance preparedness based on accurate early warning by IMD for management of cyclone DANA. Professionally skilled manpower with required equipment were prepositioned at strategic locations to respond the cyclone DANA. As a result of this planning, the road communication, electricity supply and drinking water supply were restored in quick possible time.

As per the assessment made by different departments and affected districts, the requirement of funds towards different relief measures and immediate repair and restoration of damaged infrastructure in admissible sectors as per the extant norms of SDRF/NDRF comes to **Rs.417.69 crore**.

The coastal Odisha is frequently affected by cyclonic disturbances originating from the Bay of Bengal which is adversely affecting the livelihood of the people and burdening the State with huge cost for restoration of the damaged infrastructure. The energy sector takes the maximum brunt of the cyclones which requires frequent and high capital investment from the State exchequer detrimentally affecting the wage and means position of the State. The State Government feels that more support is required from the Central Government for building resilience to the public infrastructure like energy and dwelling units of the poor people staying in vulnerable coastal area of the State. The saline embankments along the coastline also need to be raised and strengthened for preventing damage to agricultural fields and habitations from surge.

The Government of India may consider supporting the State Government for taking up the above disaster resilient activities.


